### **Americas Competitiveness Forum 2010**

### "Building a Prosperous and Sustainable Future for the Americas"

The Americas Competitiveness Forum (ACF) is the Western Hemisphere's preeminent event for government and business leaders to discuss innovative methods to achieve economic competitiveness and promote innovation in the Americas.

The ACF distinguishes itself from other international gatherings by promoting novel approaches to economic competitiveness and enabling private and public sector representatives to take advantage of creative opportunities to explore new business models and expand their businesses.

At ACF 2010, over 1,000 participants will have the opportunity to contribute and learn how to improve the way we do business in the Americas. In addition to plenary sessions and breakout panels, participants may choose from a variety of additional events and services, including regional market opportunity sessions, export counseling sessions, business-to-business meetings, and business-to-government meetings with over thirty government delegations from the hemisphere.

ACF 2010 will be more than a discussion; it will serve as a launching pad for a continued and practical dialogue on competitiveness in the Western Hemisphere.

### **TRACKS**

The ACF will include several plenary discussions coupled with a series of breakout discussion on four topics that are the key drivers of competitiveness. These themes are: Innovation and Green Technologies; Education and Workforce Development; Entrepreneurship and Small Business Development; and Supply Chain Connections.

### **Innovation and Green Technologies**

Clean energy technologies can create jobs, reduce waste, improve productivity, cut greenhouse gas emissions, improve local air quality, enhance energy security and fight energy poverty throughout the Western Hemisphere. Leading practitioners and experts will share best practices for applying green technologies that benefit the environment and result in cost savings and efficiency gains. Experts will also discuss renewable energy market potential, efforts to embrace smart grid and energy efficiency technologies, and how universities and training centers can address the clean technology needs of the energy industry.

### **Panel Descriptions**

### Educating a 21st Century Green & Sustainable Workforce Monday, November 15, 11:15AM – 12:30PM

This panel will discuss the clean tech needs of the energy industry and how schools, universities, and training centers can help fulfill those needs. Experts will share best practices for developing and implementing renewable energy curriculum as well as for increasing research and collaborating with industry so firms across the region can hire the skilled labor needed to develop and deploy clean energy solutions. Access to a skilled and talented workforce is the most important ingredient to business success. New energy technologies will depend on a workforce that is prepared and trained to build, operate, and maintain facilities and systems that can increase the region's supply of renewable energy. The region will also continue to need skilled scientists and engineers who can develop the next generation of clean energy technologies.

#### Panel II: Efficiency - Energy and Water Monday, November 15, 2:30PM - 3:45PM

This panel will discuss the importance of energy efficiency. Energy efficiency offers more potential for cost-effective greenhouse gas emissions reductions than any other major abatement category. Benefits also include lower energy costs, less local pollution, and greater energy security. Panelists will also discuss the inter-relationship between water and energy and explore technologies and policies that support the adoption of water reuse practices for power generation given that water is an increasingly scarce resource.



#### Panel III: Renewable Energy Tuesday, November 16, 11:30AM – 12:45PM

This panel will discuss the role of renewable energy technologies, such as solar, wind, biomass, geothermal, hydro, and ocean, in competitiveness. The focus will be on the renewable energy market potential and the sharing of best practice policies and successful implementation strategies.

### **Education and Workforce Development**

Ongoing advances in innovative technology are driving demand for a highly trained workforce in the global job market and have created unparalleled economic opportunities across the hemisphere. However, several studies and reports indicate that the region as a whole still faces major impediments to sustainable economic growth. This track will highlight some of the best global models for overcoming these challenges and examine how the business community and academia can work together to provide appropriate training to an efficient and capable labor pool to fulfill the needs of businesses and maintain competitiveness.

#### **Panel Descriptions**

### Panel I: The Role of Technology in Improving Academic Performance Monday, November 15, 11:15AM – 12:30PM

Over the last decade, we have seen a substantial increase in the integration of technology in the classroom. Some might argue that computers and internet technology have transformed the field of education. This session will focus on some of the most creative and engaging examples of computer technology being used to increase student attentiveness and performance as well as the impact of online education and distance learning at the post-secondary and continuing education levels.

#### Panel II: Retooling the Post-Secondary Education Model: The Growing Influence of Community Colleges in the Americas Monday, November 15, 2:30PM – 3:45PM

Most community colleges are designed to serve a myriad of missions and objectives. However, economic development has emerged as one of the most prominent and strategic factors in developing competitive academic disciplines that are responsive to the current global job market. This panel will present some of the most innovative models of community colleges in the hemisphere. Presenters will highlight how these institutions are attracting students and dispelling the myth that two-year technical degrees are limited to vocational programs that have limited earning potential.

### Panel III: Shaping the Talent Pipeline to Sustain Economic Growth – Success Stories Tuesday, November 16, 11:30AM – 12:45PM

In order to sustain economic growth, local communities must be more aggressive in thinking about the state of their talent pipelines in ten or even twenty years. This panel will look at a variety of ways to impact the pipeline, such as communicating with students in primary and secondary schools and investing time and resources in strategic public-private partnerships.

### **Entrepreneurship And Small Business Development**

Small and medium-sized enterprises are the engine of growth in Americas. Equipping SMEs with the tools they need to compete in the global marketplace is a priority throughout the region. This panel will highlight best practices to prepare entrepreneurs and SMEs to effectively engage in international trade. Among the topics of discussion will be social inclusion programs for historically underrepresented groups, such as women and minorities, improving SME credit worthiness and access to finance, and promoting regional innovation through public-private cooperation. Panelists from across the region will invite participants to engage in a lively discussion on best practices for small business development and entrepreneurial growth.

Panel I: Social Inclusion through Entrepreneurship Monday, November 15, 11:15AM – 12:30PM

This panel will explore the potential of entrepreneurship programs to increase the standard of living for historically underserved populations. By creating economic opportunities for women, youth, minorities, and distressed communities, entrepreneurship programs can build prosperous economic centers. Panelists will focus on best practices from the region, including the Pathways to Prosperity women's entrepreneurship mentoring program; Coca Cola's Haiti Hope Project, a public-private initiative to develop a sustainable mango industry in Haiti; and a self-empowerment and entrepreneurship training program for at-risk youth jointly administered by the Young Americas Business Trust and the Violence Prevention, Peace, and Sustainable Development Programme of the Jamaican Ministry of National Security.

### Panel II: More than a Loan: Robust Financial Services for SMEs Monday, November 15, 2:30PM – 3:45PM

How do SMEs grow into global firms? The answer is simple: money. From improving access to finance to lowering transaction costs, there are myriad resources available to help SMEs formalize their businesses, expand access to finance, and reach global markets. Panelists will focus on best practices from the region, including the Inter-American Investment Corporation's FINPYME ExportPlus program to increase SME competitiveness; the CAF's SME credit services; and IFC's secured transactions reforms, a development which allows SMEs to use movable assets as collateral for loans.

#### Panel III: Promoting Regional Innovation Tuesday, November 16, 11:30AM – 12:45PM

How does a city, state, or country become world-renown for innovation? This panel will explore successful regional innovation policies, wherein cooperation among government, research institutions, and private firms leads to practical applications of scientific innovations. Commercializing new technologies can create an immense competitive advantage. Panelists will focus on best practices from the region, including the Technological Innovation in Small Businesses Program at the São Paulo Research Foundation; Mexico's university-led clusters, headquartered at the Technical University in Monterrey; and institutionalizing innovative practices within a national agency, such as Uruguay's National Research and Innovation Agency.

The workshop will provide a venue for Caribbean participants to hear from global experts on best practices for establishing national competitiveness councils and implementing a competitiveness agenda.

### Regional Market Opportunity Panels Monday, November 15, 4:00PM – 7:30PM

Join trade and economy ministers for a conversation about market opportunities in the Americas. Hear firsthand from foreign government officials about national priorities that could translate into business opportunities for your company. ### **General Session Speaker Bios**



Speaker: Gary Locke
U.S. Secretary of Commerce

Gary Locke was appointed by President Obama as the 36th Secretary of Commerce and sworn into office on March 26, 2009. At the Department of Commerce, Secretary Locke is charged with helping implement President Obama's ambitious agenda to turn around the economy and put people back to work.

As the popular two-term governor of Washington, the nation's most trade-dependent state, Secretary Locke broke down trade barriers around the world to advance American products. He helped open doors

for Washington State businesses by leading 10 productive trade missions to Asia, Mexico and Europe, significantly expanding the sale of Washington products and services. He also successfully strengthened economic ties between China and Washington State. His visits are credited with introducing Washington companies to China and helping more than double the state's exports to China to over \$5 billion per year.

As part of his considerable trade and economic development efforts, Secretary Locke launched Washington's Competitiveness Council with business, labor and civic leaders working together to effectively position Washington State for success at home and around the world. During the eight years of the Locke Administration, the state gained 280,000 jobs.



**Speaker: Kasim Reed Mayor, City of Atlanta** 

Mayor Kasim Reed was inaugurated as the City of Atlanta's 59th Mayor on January 4, 2010. Since taking office, Mayor Reed has worked to improve public safety, create new opportunities for the City's youth, restore fiscal stability to the City and provide faster and more efficient customer service to residents.

Prior to his election, Mayor Reed established a track record of leadership during his 11 years as a member of the Georgia General Assembly. He was first elected in 1998 as a State Representative and served two

terms. From 2002-2009, he served in the Georgia State Senate, where he was Vice Chairman of the Senate Democratic Caucus.

As an undergraduate member of Howard University's Board of Trustees, he created a fundraising program that has contributed more than \$10 million to the school's endowment since its inception. Mayor Reed was appointed as Howard University's youngest General Trustee in June 2002 and remains a member of the Board of Trustees.

Mayor Reed is Chair of the Transportation and Communications Committee of the U.S. Conference of Mayors and Chair of the Regional Transit Committee of the Atlanta Regional Commission. He is a member of the Leadership Georgia Class of 2000 and Leadership Atlanta Class of 1998, and was named to the Aspen Institute-Rodel Fellowship Class of 2007. Mayor Reed is also a former Board Member of both the National Black Arts Festival and Metropolitan Atlanta Arts Fund.



Speaker: Rich Oliver
Executive Vice President, Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta

Rich Oliver is an executive vice president with the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta and has been with the Bank since 1973. Since 1998, he has served as retail payments product manager for the Federal Reserve System. In this capacity, he has responsibility for managing the Fed's check and ACH businesses nationwide.

Earlier in his career, Mr. Oliver served as planning analyst, administrator of the Automated Clearinghouse, chairman of the Federal Reserve's Electronic Payments Implementation Task Force, manager and officer in charge of software development, vice president in charge of automation services, the Federal Reserve System's product manager for electronic payments services, officer in charge of business development and check software, and staff director for the Federal Reserve System's Policy Committee for Financial Services. He also serves on the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta's Management Committee.

Mr. Oliver received a bachelor's degree in math from the University of Nevada, a master's degree in information and computer sciences from Georgia Institute of Technology, and an MBA in management from Georgia State University. He has also completed executive development programs at Harvard University and the University of Tennessee.

Master of Ceremonies: Francisco J. Sánchez
Under Secretary of Commerce for International Trade, U.S. Department of Commerce,
International Trade Administration

As Under Secretary, Francisco Sánchez leads the International Trade Administration, which assists in the development of U.S. trade policy in the global economy; creates jobs and economic growth by promoting U.S. companies; strengthens American competitiveness across all industries; addresses market access and compliance issues; administers U.S. trade laws; and undertakes a range of trade promotion and trade advocacy efforts.

As a senior policy advisor to President Obama during the 2008 campaign, Under Secretary Sánchez served as the Chairman of the National Hispanic Leadership Council and also provided policy support on issues pertaining to Latin America. Mr. Sánchez now brings his wide range of experience in both federal and state government as well as in the private sector to his leadership position at ITA. Under Secretary Sánchez served as the Assistant Secretary for Aviation and International Affairs at the U.S. Department of Transportation during the Clinton administration, where he developed aviation policy and oversaw international negotiations. Under Secretary Sánchez had previously served in the White House as a Special Assistant to the President and Chief of Staff to the Special Envoy to the Americas, Kenneth MacKay, where he focused on economic integration and democracy issues throughout the Western Hemisphere. He began his career in government working as Director of Florida's Caribbean Basin Initiative Program for then-Governor Bob Graham.



Speaker: Jim Clifton President and CEO, The Gallup Organization

Since 1988, Jim Clifton has served as CEO of Gallup, a leader in organizational consulting and public opinion research. His most recent innovation, the Gallup World Poll, is designed to give the world's 6 billion citizens a voice in virtually all key global issues. Mr. Clifton has pledged to continue this effort to collect world opinion for 100 years in 150 countries.

Under Mr. Clifton's leadership, Gallup has achieved a fifteenfold increase in its billing volume and expanded Gallup from a predominantly U.S.-based company to a worldwide organization with 40 offices in 30 countries and regions. Mr. Clifton is also the creator of The Gallup Path, a metric-based economic model that establishes the linkages among human nature in the workplace, customer engagement, and business outcomes. This model is used in performance management systems in more than 500 companies worldwide.

Mr. Clifton serves on several boards and is Chairman of the Thurgood Marshall College Fund. He has received honorary degrees from Jackson State, Medgar Evers, and Bellevue Universities.



Panelist: Pamela Cox World Bank Vice President for the Latin America and the Caribbean Region

Pamela Cox is a development economist and has held management positions in various countries and regions since joining the Bank in 1980. From 2000 to 2004, Ms. Cox was Director of Strategy and Operations in the Office of the Vice President for the Africa Region, where she oversaw the increase of Bank lending to the poorest African countries. Previously, she served as Country Director for South Africa, Botswana, Lesotho, Namibia and Swaziland from 1996 to 2000. During 1994-1996, she was Chief of the Country Operations Division in East Asia covering Vietnam, Laos, Cambodia, Myanmar, the Philippines,

Malaysia, Thailand and Korea. She served as Chief of the Agriculture and Environment Operations Division from 1992 to 1994 in the same region.

During the early years of her career in the Bank, Ms. Cox was an economist working on agricultural and environmental issues in the units for South Asia and Latin America. In the Latin America and the Caribbean Region, Ms. Cox was a senior economist in the Agriculture Division (1985-87), where she worked primarily with Brazil.



Panelist: José María Figueres Olsen CEO, Concordia 21

José María Figueres served as President of Costa Rica from 1994 to 1998. As such, he was the youngest President of a Central American country in modern times. During his presidency, he created a comprehensive national Sustainable Development strategy combining sound macroeconomic indicators, together with strategic investment in human development, and a strong alliance with nature through the implementation of innovative environmental policies. Prior to serving as President he was Minister of Foreign Trade (1987-1988) and Minister of Agriculture (1988-1990).

In the international arena he has pioneered the linkage between Sustainable Development and technology, in the realms of business, public service, and non-profit organizations. He helped create and lead the United Nations Information and Communication Technologies Task Force (ICT) and is the founder of the Fundación Costa Rica para el Desarrollo Sostenible (Entebbe) in Costa Rica. In 2000, President Figueres joined the World Economic Forum and became its first CEO in 2003, where he strengthened global corporate ties to social and governmental sectors by identifying common long-term interests.

Today he continues to work in the fields of technology and development, and is currently the CEO of CONCORDIA 21, based in Spain, dedicated to the support of organizations which promote development and democratic values around the world.



Panelist: Enrique Garcia
Executive Chairman of CAF

The Executive Chairman is the top legal, managerial, and administrative authority of the Institution and is responsible for all matters not specifically assigned to another body of CAF. The Executive Chairman focuses on adopting strategic plans for countries and sectors, institutional structures and processes within their authority, and financial transactions that are within the limits set by the Board. The Executive Chairman is elected for a period of five-years and is eligible for reelection.

Mr. Garcia was originally chosen for the 1991-1996 term and subsequently reelected for the 1996 – 2001 term, the 2001-2006 term, and was again reelected to a new five-year period that will end in December 2011.



Panelist: José Miguel Insulza Secretary General of the Organization of American States

Mr. Insulza was elected OAS Secretary General on May 2, 2005, and took office on May 26 of that year. In the early 1970s, Insulza played an active role in Salvador Allende's Popular Unity government. Following the coup that brought General Augusto Pinochet into power, he went into exile for 15 years, first in Rome (1974-1980) and later in Mexico (1981-1988). In Mexico City, he served as Director of the United States Studies Institute in the Center for Economic Research and Teaching (CIDE). He also taught at Mexico's National Autonomous University, the Ibero-American University, and the Diplomatic Studies Institute.

Under the presidency of Patricio Aylwin, Insulza served as Chilean Ambassador for International Cooperation, Director of Multilateral Economic Affairs at the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, and Vice President of the International Cooperation Agency.

In March 1994, Insulza joined the administration of President Eduardo Frei, serving as first as Under-Secretary of Foreign Affairs and later as Minister of Foreign Affairs. In 1999, he became Minister Secretary General of the Presidency, and was appointed the following year to be President Ricardo Lagos's Minister of the Interior and Vice President of the Republic. When Insulza left that post in May 2005, he had served as a government minister for more than a decade, the longest continuous tenure for a minister in Chilean history.

Moderator: Andrés Van der Horst Executive Director, Competitiveness National Council

As the executive director of the Competitiveness National Council, Andrés van der Horst is largely responsible for the implementation of the Competitiveness National Plan also for supervising the project managers in charge of the research and analytical studies that support the development initiative in the manufacturing sector. The CNC creates competitiveness and functional strategies for different sectors of the Dominican economy, supporting the government in the projects and initiatives necessary to enhance productivity and quality, and creating the environment for private and public sector interaction.

Mr. Van der Horst has a Degree in Business Administration from the Pontificia Universidad Católica Madre y Maestra, a Masters Degrees in Science of Strategic Management and a Business Administration Major in Finance from the University of Miami, and a Masters in Marketing and International Commerce from the University of Barcelona.



Speaker: Scott Davis
Chairman and Chief Executive Officer of UPS

Under the direction of Scott Davis, UPS is expanding its capabilities into new lines of business that complement the company's global package delivery operations.

Prior to his current position, Mr. Davis served as vice chairman and chief financial officer. Mr. Davis joined UPS in 1986 when the company acquired Oregon technology company, II Morrow. He had served as the chief financial officer and then CEO. Beginning in 1991, Mr. Davis held positions of increasing responsibility as treasury manager, financial reports and plans manager and accounting manager. From late 1998 to

early 2000, he served as chief executive officer of Overseas Partners, Ltd., a reinsurance company. Mr. Davis then rejoined UPS as its vice president of finance. In that position, he was responsible for banking, investments, mergers and acquisitions, tax and investor relations. Davis joined the UPS Management Committee in 2001, when he assumed position of chief financial officer.

Mr. Davis currently serves on the Board of Honeywell International, Inc. He also is a member of the President's Export Council; The Business Council; serves as a trustee of the Annie E. Casey Foundation, and is a member of The Carter Center Board of Councilors. Mr. Davis completed a term as chairman of the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta in 2009.



Speaker: Sonny Perdue Governor, State of Georgia

Sonny Perdue was sworn in as Georgia's 81st Governor on January 13, 2003. Governor Perdue immediately went to work reforming the state budget, setting priorities, and cutting wasteful spending. His efforts helped stimulate the economy and turn the state budget deficit that he inherited in to a substantial surplus. During Governor Perdue's first term, Georgia created over 200,000 new jobs and posted the highest graduation rate and SAT scores in state history. After a first term marked by numerous accomplishments, Governor Perdue won re-election in November 2006.

Governor Perdue has led the state based on his life experiences prior to entering public service. He graduated from Warner Robins High School and earned a doctorate in veterinary medicine in 1971 from the University of Georgia. Following his service as a Captain in the United States Air Force, Perdue became a successful small business owner, concentrating in agribusiness and transportation.



Introduction: Mark Elliott
President of North America, Promethean

Mark joined Promethean in 2005 as President of North America, following 28 years of experience in sales, marketing, and operations for both technical and software organizations.

Prior to joining Promethean, Mark was a Senior Director of Apple Computer's Education Division, where he managed all solutions outside of the hardware platform, including Apple Care, Apple Software, Strategic Initiatives, Alliances, and Channels.

Previously, in his 14 years at Burroughs/Unisys, he was promoted several times within the company, leading ultimately to his appointment as Regional Director of Marketing. Mark also served as VP of Lawson Software's Retail Division and VP of sales, marketing, and product development for Education Networks of America. Mark holds a BBA in Economics and Master of Science degree in Industrial Management.



Keynote Address: Arturo Valenzuela
U.S. Assistant Secretary of State for Western Hemisphere Affairs

Dr. Arturo Valenzuela assumed responsibilities as Assistant Secretary of State for Western Hemisphere Affairs on November 10, 2009. Dr. Valenzuela was previously Professor of Government and Director of the Center for Latin American Studies in the Edmund A. Walsh School of Foreign Service at Georgetown University. He is a specialist on the origins and consolidation of democracy, the institutional dimensions of democratic governance, Latin American politics, and U.S.-Latin American relations. Prior to joining the Georgetown faculty he was Professor of Political Science and Director of the Council on Latin American

Studies at Duke University. He has been a Visiting Scholar at Oxford University, the University of Sussex, the University of Florence (Italy) and the Catholic University of Chile.

During the Clinton administration, Dr. Valenzuela served at the White House as Special Assistant to the President and Senior Director for Inter-American Affairs at the National Security Council and as Deputy Assistant Secretary for Inter-American Affairs at the U.S. Department of State, where his primary responsibility was United States foreign policy towards Mexico. A member of the Council on Foreign Relations, he has been listed in Who's Who in America and Who's Who in American Higher Education and has served on the editorial boards of leading academic journals. For his diplomatic contributions he has been honored with the National Order of the Southern Cross by the government of Brazil and the Order of Boyacá by the government of Colombia.



Introduction: Tony Clement Minister of Industry, Canada

Tony Clement is Canada's Minister of Industry. He is also the Member of Parliament for Parry Sound-Muskoka since 2006. As Industry Minister Mr. Clement has the lead role in developing and implementing Canada's economic strategy to become even more competitive and innovative. Minister Clement also has special responsibility for Northern Ontario as Minister responsible for FedNor, the federal economic development agency for the region.

During his private sector career Minister Clement used his training in law to work in and gain an in-depth understanding of the world of business and entrepreneurship. He has, in fact, put this knowledge into practice by working, at different points in his career, as a small business owner and entrepreneur. Minister Clement's dedication to public service spans three decades, with time as Canada's Health Minister and four different Cabinet roles in the Ontario Government.



Panelist: His Excellency Danilo Astori
Vice President of the Oriental Republic of Uruguay

Vice President Astori is the leader of the Asamblea Uruguay Faction of the Frente Amplio Party. He served as Minister of Economy and Finance (2005- 08), and as Senator (1985-2015). His journalist experience included editorial writer of leftist weekly "Brecha," former monthly magazine "Tres" and leading conservative daily "El País." Vice President Astorialso served as Deputy Director of the Office of Programs and Agricultural Policies of the Ministry of Agriculture (1963-67), as UN advisor on economic and agriculture

issues, as advisor to ECLAC (Santiago de Chile – 1967-70), as Dean of the School of Economic Sciences (1971-73, 1985-89). Vice President Astori is reputedly the author of over 60 books. In June 1995, Vice President Astori participated in an IDB-sponsored seminar in Washington which focused on social security reform.



Panelist: His Excellency Angelino Garzón
Vice President of the Republic of Colombia

Vice President Garzón's main portfolio is human rights and labor. As a union leader, he was the Secretary General of the United Workers Confederation (CUT) from 1981 until 1990. During this time, he actively supported the protection of labor leaders. His first involvement in politics was as a member of the Communist Party (approx. 1981-85), where he served on the Executive Committee. When the Union Patriotica (UP) party was formed in 1985 by a range of social movements, Revolutionary Armed Forces of

Colombia (FARC) members purportedly interested in abandoning their armed struggle for political representation, and the Communist Party, Vice President Garzón joined the UP (approx. 1985-90) with his Communist colleagues and became its Vice President. However, he had disagreements with UP leadership, so he left for the Democratic Alliance/M-19 (AD) Party. He represented the AD at the 1991 Constituent Assembly that drafted Colombia's Constitution. After receiving death threats, Garzón left Colombia and the AD for self-exile in Spain (approx. 1993).

Vice President Garzón represented Colombia as Ambassador to the United Nations in Geneva (most notably the International Labor Organization) from January 2009 until March 8, 2010, when he became a candidate for Vice President of Colombia. He also participated in the Carter Center's mediation efforts to reestablish relations between Colombia and Ecuador. Vice President Garzón has been a strong supporter of the U.S.-Colombia Trade Promotion Agreement (CTPA) and even accompanied President Uribe to lobby the U.S. Congress in June 2007.



Panelist: His Excellency Luis Liberman Ginsburg Second Vice President of the Republic of Costa Rica

Luis Liberman Ginsburg was elected Second Vice President of Costa Rica on the ticket of President Laura Chinchilla and First Vice President Alfio Piva, which took office on May 8, 2010. Dr. Ginsburg earned a B.A. in economics at the University of California and his Ph.D. in economics from the University of Illinois. He also was an economics instructor at the University of Illinois from 1968-1972, and then an economist in the industrial finance division of the World Bank until 1975. Subsequently he became an advisor to the National Planning Office of Costa Rica and began teaching at the University of Costa Rica as an economics professor

which he continued for 25 years. From 1976-1978, Dr. Liberman served as Economic Advisor to the President of Costa Rica and as Vice Minister of Finance.

In 1982, he founded the bank which later became Interfin Bank, where he served as General Manager and Vice Chairman of the Board to transform it into one of the strongest and most important financial institutions in the country. Interfin became Scotiabank Costa Rica, and Dr. Liberman served as Senior Vice President and General Manager from 2006-2009. He has also served on several occasions as president of the Costa Rican Banking Association, and a Board Member of the Chamber of Industry. Dr. Liberman has also been engaged in a variety of civic and community initiatives, including reforestation of species in La Sabana, policies to promote women in senior management positions, school infrastructure in marginal areas, and programs to protect children in areas impacted by drug addiction and violence.



Panelist: His Excellency Juan Carlos Varela Vice President of the Republic of Panama

Vice President Juan Carlos Varela was sworn into office as President Martinelli's Vice President and Foreign Minister on July 1, 2009. Since 1985, he was manager of a family-owned liquor company Varela Hermanos and became its executive vice president in 2008.

Vice President Varela began his early political career in Chiriqui Province in 1977, organizing for the political party Arnulfista, now called Partido Panameñista or PP. He participated in campaigns of the late party founder Arnulfo Arias in 1984 and of the late President Guillermo Endara in 1989. Varela was deputy

manager and coordinator for the political campaign of Arias' widow, former President Mireya Moscoso, in 1994. In 1999, he was the manager for PP presidential candidate Alberto Vallarino. He was a member of the PP National Board of Directors from 1992 to 1999 and was PP president during the most recent presidential elections. Varela won the July 2008 PP primary and became its 2009 presidential nominee, but he later renounced his own candidacy to become President Martinelli's running mate.



Moderator: Lynn Martinez Emmy Award Winning Journalist

Emmy Award winning Lynn Martinez anchors 7 NEWS First at 4, 7 NEWS at 4:30, 5:30 and 7 News at 6:30PM. She also co-hosts the popular entertainment show "Deco Drive" at 7:30PM. Martinez came to WSVN in 1991 as a co-anchor of TODAY IN FLORIDA, WSVN's # 1 rated morning news program and general assignment reporter. One of a trio of anchors in the morning, Martinez quickly rose through the ranks and was promoted to weekend anchor. Two years later, she moved to her current assignment on the weeknight news. In 1998, she began co-hosting Deco Drive, the half-hour news magazine show known

for celebrity news and the latest on the South Florida entertainment circuit. Martinez began her broadcasting career in 1989 at the CBS affiliate in Cadillac, Michigan, where she served as an anchor and producer. During her 16 years at WSVN, Martinez has covered the inauguration of President Bill Clinton, was one of the first U.S. reporters to cover the atrocities in Bosnia, traveled to Holland after the murder of a German tourist in Miami, and went to Rome to cover the Pope. She was also featured on the Fox program "America's Most Wanted" on a story about how to survive a carjacking. She's covered numerous hurricanes including Andrew in 1999 and Wilma in 2005. For "Deco Drive," Martinez has also interviewed numerous celebrities, among them: Gloria and Emilio Estefan, Julio Iglesias, Cameron Diaz, Andy Garcia and Keanu Reeves. Martinez won an award for a series on organ donation called "Dying for an Organ," and was nominated for an Emmy for her coverage of Hurricane Andrew. Martinez is actively involved with numerous charitable organizations, including "Women in Distress," a program that provides shelter and services for the victims of domestic abuse. In 2004, Lynn received an Emmy for the "Women in Distress", Public Service Announcement she is featured in. Martinez has a masters and bachelor's degree in journalism from Webster University in St. Louis, Missouri. She is married and has two children.

Michael C. Camuñez was nominated by President Barack Obama and, on September 16, 2010, unanimously confirmed by the United States Senate as the Assistant Secretary of Commerce for Market Access and Compliance (MAC) within the International Trade Administration. As Assistant Secretary, Mr. Camuñez plays a critical role in supporting the President's economic recovery agenda by helping to coordinate the Commerce Department's efforts to create American jobs through the National Export Initiative. Under

Mr. Camuñez's leadership, MAC will help lead the effort to open new markets for U.S. goods and services, identify and eliminate significant market access challenges, particularly non-tariff barriers, and help to monitor and enforce U.S. trade agreements and commitments to ensure that American companies, and the workers they employ, can compete on a level playing field.

Prior to assuming his role at Commerce, Mr. Camuñez served in the White House from the beginning of the administration as Special Counsel to the President in the Office of the White House Counsel as well as Special Assistant to the President, advising the President and senior White House Officials on issues related to executive nominations and appointments in the domestic cabinet and independent agencies.



Panelist: Frederico Fleury Curado President and CEO, Embraer, S.A.

Frederico Fleury Curado was born in Rio de Janeiro and received his under-graduate degree in Mechanical-Aeronautical Engineering from Brazil's Aeronautics Technological Institute (Instituto Tecnológico de Aeronáutica – ITA). In addition, he has a post-graduate degree in Foreign Trade from the Getúlio Vargas Foundation (Fundação Getúlio Vargas – FGV) and an International Executive MBA from the University of São Paulo (Universidade de São Paulo – USP). Curado joined Embraer in 1984. On April 23, 2007, he was appointed President and CEO of Embraer by the Board of Directors.

Panelist: Dionisio Gutiérrez Mayorga Corporate President, CMI

Dr. Gutiérrez has a Bachelors Degree in Business Administration, a Masters Degree in International Management and Finance and a Doctorate Degree, Summa Cum Laude, in Political Sciences and Sociology from the Universidad Pontificia of Salamanca.

He is the Corporate President of CMI, Corporación Multi-Inversiones, a multinational company incorporated in 1902 with over thirty-thousand employees with presence in three Continents. Its operations include six sub-divisions: Molinos Modernos, an Industrial and Cattle Division, Pollo Campero, Projects for the

Generation of Renewable Energy, Development of Construction Projects and a Financial Division.

In addition, Dr. Gutierrez is the General Director of Libre Encuentro, a television program which for 19 years has been conducting analyses, interviews and debates on social, economic and political problems of the world, with emphasis on Latin America. Its audience is located in Central America and in two Hispanic television networks in the United States. In Guatemala alone, the weekly audience is one and one half million viewers.

Dr. Gutiérrez is a member of the Board of Trustees of the Francisco Marroquin University, he also is a member of the "G50", Group of the 50 with headquarters in Washington, D. C. Participates in the Council of the Americas based in New York and participated in Barómetro, a civic group in Guatemala.

For seven years Dr. Gutiérrez was President of the Chamber for Free Enterprise. He has also been a Director of the Guatemalan Managers Association, Director of the Chamber of Commerce, Director of the Banco de Occidente and an active member of the group of political observers of Latin America.

Since the democratic opening in Central America during the 80s, in addition to being a businessman committed to development and democracy, Dr. Gutiérrez has had a relevant participation in critical moments in the region as confirmed by his public career.



Moderator: Deborah L. Wince-Smith
President and CEO of the U.S. Council on Competitiveness

Deborah L. Wince-Smith is internationally renowned as a leading voice on competitiveness, innovation strategy, science and technology policy, energy, education, economics and business. As president of the Council, Ms. Wince-Smith spearheaded the groundbreaking National Innovation Initiative (NII), which played a pivotal role in creating a reinvigorated U.S. competitiveness movement. The NII shaped the bipartisan America COMPETES Act, created state and regional innovation initiatives, and brought a global focus to innovation.

During her 17-year tenure in the federal government, Ms. Wince-Smith held leading positions in the areas of science, technology policy and international economic affairs. Most notably, she served as the nation's first assistant secretary of commerce for technology policy in the administration of George H.W. Bush, overseeing federal technology transfer policy, implementation of the Bayh-Dole Act, and the White House National Technology Initiative. She was also the first assistant director of international affairs and competitiveness in the White House Office of Science and Technology Policy and the architect of the landmark Head of Government Science and Technology Agreement with Japan.



Panelist: Eduardo Solórzano Morales
President and CEO, Wal-Mart Latin America

Eduardo Solórzano Morales is responsible for the company's operations in Argentina, Brazil, Chile, Costa Rica, El Salvador, Guatemala, Honduras, Mexico and Nicaragua, as well as business development of Wal-Mart in the Latin America region. Mr. Solórzano led Wal-Mart de México from 2005 until 2010, and oversaw dramatic expansion of the business in terms of units, associates, sales and share value. With the company's acquisition of Wal-Mart's operations in Central America, he was instrumental in expanding the company beyond Mexico. In addition, he was responsible for the conception and creation of Banco Wal-

Mart, the world's first Wal-Mart bank, and the development of successful new formats such as Bodega Aurrera Express.

His career at Wal-Mart de México began in 1985, when he joined Grupo Cifra-Aurrera, holding several management positions in operations, merchandising and logistics. In 1998, he was named director of food for Wal-Mart Supercenter, and later, as the vice president, he was instrumental in the successful implementation of the Every Day Low Prices strategy in Mexico. He went on to be named executive vice president for self-service and then chief operating officer before being named president and CEO of Wal-Mart de México.




