Wisconsin Exports to Australia



Wisconsin's export shipments of merchandise to Australia in 2003 totaled \$280 million, the 13th largest figure among the 50 states. Exports to Australia accounted for 2.4 percent of the state total in 2003, the tenth largest share of all the states.

Australia was Wisconsin's eighth largest export market in 2003, ranked between France and Belgium.


Wisconsin's exports to Australia grew \$26 million from 1999 to 2003; this was the 19th largest dollar increase among the states. The \$26 million gain was also the 15th largest export increase recorded by the state to its major markets.

The overwhelming majority (99 percent) of Wisconsin's exports to Australia are manufactured goods.

The state's top export category to Australia, by far, is machinery manufactures. In 2003, Wisconsin exported \$166 million worth of machinery to Australia, representing 59 percent of the state's total exports (including non-manufactures) to this market. Within the machinery category, agricultural and construction machinery accounted for \$66 million; engines, turbines, and power transmission equipment accounted for \$56 million; and industrial machinery accounted for \$24 million.



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worth of these goods to Australia, of which \$27 million was navigational, measuring, electromedical, and control instruments. These two categories—machinery combined with computers and electronic products—together were responsible for nearly three-quarters (74 percent) of the state's total exports to Australia in 2003.



The increase in Wisconsin's exports to Australia during 1999–2003 was mainly due to a \$29 million increase in shipments of machinery manufactures.
